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this is an account of the turbulent centuries in which the forces of rome subdued the peoples of italy incorporated their aristocracies
and created by the end of the first century bc a unified italian state of roman citizens at the time of the second punic war when hannibal
descended from the alps italy consisted of several ancient settlements and peoples among them the gauls in the north the etruscans in
the center the greeks on the southern coasts and in sicily and the indigenous phoenicians in sardinia the romans themselves occupied
little more than one tenth of what is now modern italy the process by which these people were incorporated into the roman polity was
violent and effective the state that augustus inherited was not only the largest in the ancient world but efficiently ordered and
administered from the roman center the book opens with a description of the peoples of italy at around the end of the fourth century bc
it describes the early success of roman diplomacy and force in creating client populations among the etruscans the latins and the

hellenized populations of the south at the beginning of the period the italian peoples sought to preserve their independence and ethnic traditions by its end those who had not achieved roman citizenship were demanding it the author describes the dramatic change in the roman economy and polity during the period he also examines the causes and consequences of the massive changes in population that took place including the effects of the enslavement and importation of large numbers of defeated rebels including for example over one million gauls this is an outstanding history of the formative years of roman power it is concisely and clearly written and takes full account of recent scholarship and archaeological discoveries in italy

includes pictures includes ancient accounts of britain includes online resources and a bibliography for further reading the romans thinking that it might be some help to the allies britons whom they were forced to abandon constructed a strong stone wall from sea to sea in a straight line between the towns that had been there built for fear of the enemy where severus also had formerly built a rampart bede s description of hadrian s wall in the middle ages the famous conqueror from the european continent came ashore with thousands of men ready to set up a new kingdom in england the britons had resisted the amphibious invasion from the moment his forces landed but he was able to push forward in a large winter battle the britons large army attacked the invaders but was eventually routed and the conqueror was able to set up a new kingdom over 1 100 years before william the conqueror became the king of england after the battle of hastings julius caesar came saw and conquered part of britannia setting up a roman province with a puppet king in 54 bce in the new province the romans eventually constructed a military outpost overlooking a bridge across the river thames the new outpost was named londinium and it covered just over two dozen acres for most of the past 1 000 years london has been the most dominant city in the

world ruling over so much land that it was said the sun never set on the british empire with the possible exception of rome no city has ever been more important or influential than london in human history thus it was only fitting that it was the romans who established london as a prominent city londinium was initially little more than a small military outpost near the northern boundary of the roman province of britannia but its access to the river thames and the north sea made it a valuable location for a port during the middle of the 1st century ce the romans conducted another invasion of the british isles after which londinium began to grow rapidly as the romans stationed legions there to defend against the britons londinium became a thriving international port allowing trade with rome and other cities across the empire by the 2nd century ce londinium was a large roman city with tens of thousands of inhabitants using villas palaces a forum temples and baths the roman governor ruled from the city in a basilica that served as the seat of government what was once a 30 acre outpost now spanned 300 acres and was home to nearly 15 000 people including roman soldiers officials and foreign merchants the romans also built heavy defenses for the city constructing several forts and the massive london wall parts of which are still scattered across the city today ancient roman remains continue to dot london s landscape today reminding everyone that almost a millennium before it became the home of royalty london was already a center of power the romans were master builders and much of what they built has stood the test of time throughout their vast empire they have left grand structures from the forum and pantheon in rome to the theatres and hippodromes of north africa and the triumphal gates in anatolia and france wherever they went the romans built imposing structures to show their power and ability and one of their most impressive constructions was built on the northernmost fringe of the empire shortly after the emperor hadrian came to power in the early 2nd century ce he decided to seal off scotland from

roman britain with an ambitious wall stretching from sea to sea to accomplish this the wall had to be built from the mouth of the river tyne where newcastle stands today 80 roman miles 76 miles or 122 kilometers west to bowness on solway the sheer scale of the job still impresses people today and hadrian s wall has the advantage of being systematically studied and partially restored

is there anyone on earth who is so narrow minded or uninquisitive that he could fail to want to know how and thanks to what kind of political system almost the entire known world was conquered and brought under a single empire in less than fifty three years polybius histories the 53 year period polybius had in mind stretched from the start of the second punic war in 219 bce until 167 when rome overthrew the macedonian monarchy and divided the country into four independent republics this was the crucial half century of rome s spectacular rise to imperial status but roman interest in its eastern neighbors began a little earlier with the first illyrian war of 229 and climaxed later with the infamous destruction of corinth in 146 taken at the flood chronicles this momentous move by rome into the greek east until now this period of history has been overshadowed by the threat of carthage in the west but events in the east were no less important in themselves and robin waterfield s account reveals the peculiar nature of rome s eastern policy for over seventy years the romans avoided annexation so that they could commit their military and financial resources to the fight against carthage and elsewhere though ultimately a failure this policy of indirect rule punctuated by periodic brutal military interventions and intense diplomacy worked well for several decades until the senate finally settled on more direct forms of control waterfield s fast paced

narrative focuses mainly on military and diplomatic maneuvers but throughout he interweaves other topics and themes such as the influence of greek culture on rome the roman aristocratic ethos and the clash between the two best fighting machines the ancient world ever produced the macedonian phalanx and roman legion the result is an absorbing account of a critical chapter in rome's mastery of the mediterranean

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the story of the claudian conquest of britain was only partly recorded by ancient historians tacitus annals breaks off at the death of tiberius while the narrative of cassius dio survives only as a collection of selected pieces much of the missing knowledge has been recaptured by archaeological research as a result we have a better understanding of the tribal society which then existed in britain and this can help us to appreciate the courses of military action open to plautius the commanding roman general peddie argues that organization and supply problems of the roman task force dictated roman tactics he discusses what these may have been examines the reasons for a seemingly isolated foray into the west country and suggests that the guerrilla campaign of ad 43 52 denied the romans their hope of a speedy conquest

includes pictures includes ancient accounts includes online resources and a bibliography for further reading spain's geographical position has made it a focus of attention throughout history for numerous migrants traders colonizers and conquerors alike iberia also known as hispaniola or hispania is in the southwestern corner of europe and is separated from africa by a mere eight miles the point at which the mediterranean meets the atlantic the whole of the iberian peninsula which today incorporates the modern nation states of spain and portugal was known to the romans and greeks as hispania over the centuries before roman involvement in the iberian peninsula it had been settled by different waves of eastern tribes celts phoenicians greeks africans and carthaginians it was the

settlement in the south of Spain by the last of these that led to Roman interest in the area and ultimately to its conquest and integration into the Roman Empire though the complete process was to take over 200 years once the Carthaginian territories had been taken those parts of Hispania became the two provinces of Hispania Citerior and Hispania Ulterior which in turn were later subdivided into further provinces they became some of the wealthiest and most Romanized of the Empire's provinces but the process by which the whole of Spain came under Roman rule was both violent and complex given that the Iberian Peninsula is Europe's second largest peninsula maintaining control required vigorous efforts including Roman sponsored migrations by the Sueves, Alans, Vandals, Visigoths and other tribes for example the Visigoths first set foot on the peninsula in the year 416 where they were tasked with forcefully re-instituting Roman authority upon other Germanic invaders who had occupied the land initially the Visigoths followed instructions to a tee but as time progressed it appeared that there may have been reason to have been suspicious of the Visigoths after all in 418 they were relocated to France where they established a makeshift kingdom of their own in Toulouse when they inevitably wised up to their employer's increasingly fragile authority they realized it would not take much to squeeze the disintegrating empire out of the picture the ramifications of 600 years of Roman rule had significant consequences for the rest of the ancient world and it had a profound impact on subsequent European history in fact it can be argued that those consequences are still being felt in Spain today in terms of language culture and political complications Roman Hispania the history of ancient Rome's conquest of Spain and the Iberian Peninsula looks at the history of relations between the two ancient empires along with pictures depicting important people places and events you will learn about Roman Hispania like never before
